The Dirty Dozen

Foreplay - Warm Up Questions

1. What's the overall spice level? 1 (Not Spicy) - 10 (Spiciest Thing I've Ever Read)?
2. How does the spice level compare to the other books we've read together?
3. Do you think the touches that tie the story back to the original fairy tale are enjoyable or not? Which were your favorites?

The Spicy Bits - Gettin' Down and Dirty with the Plot

4. James saw himself as "an empty shell with a single purpose." Did you see James as broken, dangerous, or just delightfully morally gray? Did his trauma make him more attractive, more unhinged, or both?
5. "His brand of trouble" was clearly irresistible to Wendy. Would you be into that kind of wild, no-limits energy in real life—or just in fantasy?
6. Which scene made you blush the hardest—and which one would you absolutely not survive if it happened to you?
7. Do you love a "good girl" (praise kink) from your partner in real life, or is that not your thing?
8. Have you experienced dirty talk in a relationship? Total turn-on, awkward disaster, or somewhere in between?
9. Has there ever been someone in your life that you thought was one way, but as you remember it later, you realize that the view you thought you had of them never really existed in the first place, like Wendy and her dad?

10. Did you see the twist with Jon coming? What were your thoughts on how that played out?

11. Should Wendy have forgiven James for locking her up? Would you have forgiven him? Why or why not.

Aftercare - Final Thoughts

12. "It's not your circumstances that determine your worth, it's how you rise from the ashes after everything burns." Do you agree with James' philosophy, or does that feel like a motivational poster with trauma issues?

Bonus: What questions do you have for the author? If you could dog-ear a page with a question for the author, what would it be?
