We've provided the Dirty Dozen; twelve spicy and intriguing questions to spark discussion and help you uncover the spine-tingling depths of the story.

## The Dirty Dozen

### Foreplay - Warm Up Questions

1. What's the overall spice level? 1 (Not Spicy) - 10 (Spiciest Thing I've Ever Read)?
2. How does the spice level compare to the other books we've read together?
3. "*Nesta would go down swinging for Elain.*" What do you think about how Nesta, Elain, and their father treated Feyre? Why do you think Feyre continued to care about their well-being even after being taken? Would you have?

### The Spicy Bits - Gettin' Down and Dirty with the Plot

4. Feyre packs a go-bag with a "pitiful" knife and a few clothes before she crosses the wall. Do you believe in always being ready to run? If you had to pack a real-life go-bag, what would be in it?
5. What was your reaction when you found out Feyre was illiterate? Would you have asked Tamlin or Lucien to write your family, or would your pride keep you silent?
6. Feyre describes a deep emotional wound reopening as Nesta's words echo in her mind - "*illiterate, ignorant, unremarkable.*" Do you believe that words can be more harmful than actions? Why do you think Nesta was so cruel?
7. Tamlin and Lucien have a complicated dynamic built on shared trauma and loyalty. Do you think they're real friends, or are they simply bound by history and debt?
8. When Feyre traps the Suriel and deadpans, "*Is it supposed to be hard?*", it's one of her most clever moments. Do you think the Suriel allowed itself to be caught?

Why do you think it reveals so much to her?

9. Tamlin claims he would die to defend freedom from tyranny or slavery. Do you believe him? Would you be willing to die for freedom - yours or someone else's?

10. Feyre's time Under the Mountain is brutal and filled with psychological, emotional, and physical trials. Which moment would have been your personal nightmare? Which test (riddle, trials, Rhysand's bargain) would you have failed?

11. Did you solve the riddle before Feyre did? If so, what gave it away? If not, what tripped you up?

## Aftercare - Final Thoughts

12. Feyre's final transformation into a High Fae is both a death and a rebirth. What do you think she truly gave up, and what do you think she gained?

Bonus: What questions do you have for the author? If you could dog-ear a page with a question for the author, what would it be?
